

Post Secondary School

We have a series of topics related to Post Secondary education these upcoming months. We will begin by talking about the admission process to study undergraduate programs for secondary students. There are two different applications to university or to college. The process of applying to college and university is different. The student must begin deciding what path they want to follow within secondary school. This will ensure that they have all the requirements in order to get into the program they desire. The difference between college and university can vary depending on the field. College is often more hands-on experience like carpentry, mechanics and so on. University involves more scientific use of knowledge like doctors, lawyers, teachers and so on. But both are great options for students.

University Application

Secondary school students who are applying to Canadian universities must have graduated from high school with six university level courses in order to apply for a university. The six university courses vary depending on the program the student wants to apply to. Students must submit an application to the *Ontario Universities Application Centre (OUAC)*. The OUAC processes all applications for all Ontario universities. The deadlines for this application vary depending on the program to which a student is applying.

Fees: For secondary students applying to post– secondary schools in Ontario, there are fees that you need to pay for the <u>admission</u> applications. Within OUAC there is a set fee of \$130 for three initial university/programs choices. Then for each additional application the fee is \$44.

College Application

Students applying for college must have taken six mixed, college, or university level courses. They must submit an application to the *Ontario College Application Service (OCAS)*. OCAS processes the applications for colleges in Ontario. Unlike universities, colleges consider ALL applications that they receive on a predetermined deadline. After this date, they consider applications on a first-come basis.

Fees: College fees are different. For the maximum of 5 program choices (no more than 3 at any college) the fee is approx. \$95 (Other fees may apply like transcript requests and so on).
