As you know, last Thursday April 11, the Ontario Provincial budget was released. Unfortunately, as anticipated, the Legal Aid budget has been seriously affected. In addition to cutting all provincial funding for the Immigration and Refugee program, there has been a 30% cut overall to the provincial funding for Legal Aid Ontario (LAO). This will have serious effects for all areas of poverty law--family, criminal, employment, income, housing and the list goes on. As of yesterday, Tuesday April 16, Legal Aid Ontario stopped accepting new immigration and refugee clients, stopping all funding for new legal services for immigration and refugee clients, except for the preparation of asylum claim forms.
