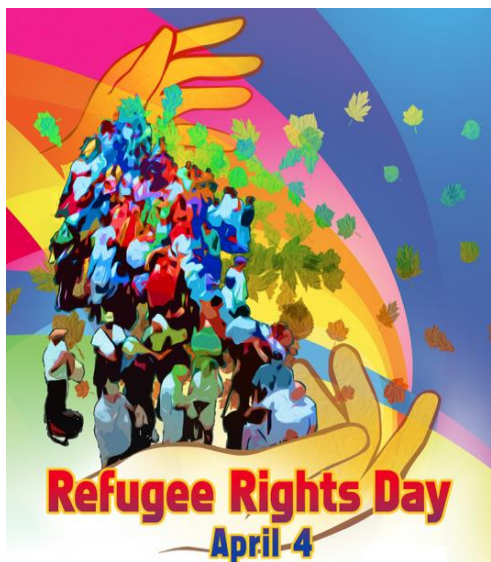


## Prayer Service to Commemorate Refugee Rights



*“REFUGEE RIGHTS DAY commemorates the April 04, 1985 Supreme Court Singh Decision – that the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms protects the right of refugee claimants in Canada to life, liberty and the security of person, and that claimants are therefore entitled to an oral hearing. Yet, as we celebrate this anniversary, the one nagging image that continues to haunt us is the reflection of refugees who continue to endure in silence because of social resistance to recognize the anguish, isolation and vulnerability of refugees or the breaking of the promise that Canada is indeed a safe haven for those who are persecuted. On April 04, REFUGEE RIGHTS DAY let us recognize that three decades since the Singh Decision, we must continue our active stand in the fight for the basic human rights of our refugee sisters and brothers.”*

SCRIPTURE: RUTH 1:7-19

Naomi set out from the place where she had been living, she and her two daughters-in-law, and they went on their way to go back to the land of Judah. But Naomi said to her daughters-in-law, *“Go back each of you to your mother’s house.”* They said to her, *“No, we will return with you to your people.”* But Naomi said, *“Turn back, my daughters, why will you go with me?”*



Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth said, *“Do not press me to leave you or to turn back from following you! Where you go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die— there will I be buried.*

*May the LORD do thus and so to me, and more as well, if even death parts me from you!”*

So the two of them went on until they came to Bethlehem.”
